- Analyse current models of artistic practice relevant to the research area
- Elaborate a theoretical framework for the research that informs and supports creative practice
- Establish an advanced professional practice that makes connections between intention, process, outcome, context and methods of dissemination and display.

Research/project work

Registration of proposal happens within 6 months of enrolment (full time) or 12 months of enrolment (part time) and is back dated to enrolment date.

Supervisors are negotiated according to student's research area.

Ethics is considered by the student and supervisors and ethical approval is applied for if relevant, at the time of registration or subsequently.

Viva examination takes place after 3 years (full time) or 5 years (part-time). The viva exhibition is the thesis to be examined, supported by a 15,000-20,000 word report.

Course Structure

All courses are credit-rated to help you to understand the amount and level of study that is needed.



One credit is equal to 10 hours of directed study time (this includes everything you do e.g. lecture, seminar and private study).

Credits are assigned to one of 6 levels:

- 3 Equivalent in standard to GCE 'A' level and is intended to prepare students for year one of an undergraduate degree course.
- 4 Equivalent in standard to the first year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 5 Equivalent in standard to the second year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 6 Equivalent in standard to the third year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 7 Equivalent in standard to a Masters degree.
- 8 Equivalent in standard to a Doctoral degree.

Courses are made up of modules that are each credit weighted.

Typical Duration



It is possible to move from full-time to part-time study and vice-versa to accommodate any external factors such as financial constraints or domestic commitments. Many of our students make use of this flexibility and this may impact on the overall duration of their study period.

In full time mode of study, the minimum duration of this course is 3 years (36 months), and the maximum duration is 4 years (48 months).

In part time mode of study, the minimum duration of this course is 5 years (60 months), and the maximum duration is 6 years (72 months).

The time limit for completion of the course is eight years after first enrolment on the course.

Additional costs:

Required:

Art materials for independent art practice (these will vary based on the work you carry out but you should budget between £200 to £1000 per year)

Optional:

Rental of private studio space (price varies depending on your space requirements but you should budget between £1500 to £3000 per year)

Recommended:

Entrance fees and travel costs for attending exhibitions (this can vary but you should budget around £50 per year).
