Most university degrees are three years long however there are some courses that are longer. E.g. Medicine/Dentistry these are five year courses.

There are also sandwich courses – This involves a year of work experience so instead of doing your third year you do a year of work experience and then do your third year afterwards so your degree is 4 years instead of 3 years.

What do you call the head of the university?

Last year nearly 330,000 students who went to university stayed at home, although most people do move into Halls of Residence or a student house when they start their degree. If you live near a college or university, or can easily commute to somewhere close by then you could save quite a bit on rent. This could be a good option for you if you need to help out at home or take care of family members/siblings.

However, you might find moving away from home for uni gives you more time to explore all the things university life offers outside of your studies - such as clubs and societies, volunteering opportunities, internships... And don't forget you can always go back home once in a while!
